Four Rivers Spring Initiatives Build Capacity Four Ways

In the Four Rivers Heritage Area this Spring, four very different efforts succeeded in taking our activities to the next level!

Website

Our completely revamped and updated website, made possible through a Marketing Grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority (MHAA), was launched on March 23, just in time for the popular Maryland Day Celebration (see page 4). The website is bright, colorful, and easy to navigate, with six major themes presented in bold colorblock-icons to engage with the visitor's interests. These become a "dashboard" for connecting with the heritage attractions and magazine-style articles in our database of options. An Events Calendar, another popular feature, helps visitors plan for upcoming activities.

Project Funding

Four Rivers offers our partners two levels of funding opportun-

ities for their heritage-related projects – the larger grants are available once each year and are offered through the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, only to organizations within a certified heritage area. In addition, we have a mini-grant opportunity usually offered twice each year (October and February). Grant projects help our partners in a variety of ways: to preserve a physical place or building, or preserve a tradition or community resource (Preservation projects); to strengthen resources and offerings (a website, a brochure, a new program, etc.); or provide much-needed funding for new or enhanced exhibits and attractions (see page 3 for a list of new grant awards).

New Visitor Product

The local arts scene is more vibrant than ever before, and one popular event, the First Sunday Arts Festival attracts thousands of visitors to the first block of West Street on the first Sunday of each month between May and November. Four Rivers debuted a new flyer/map for festival visitors about all the history and heritage attractions that are open on Sundays, to help them make the most of their day in town. Collaborative Initiatives

One of our most popular collaborative initiatives is the Maryland Day Celebration, a three-day event that marked its 10th year in March. Also this spring, Four Rivers debuted a new collaborative series called "Pop-Up Heritage" – more details appear on page 3, and events are listed on our website under "What's New." As ever, there's always something new in the Four Rivers Heritage Area!

Interpretive signs detail the histories of early 20th century beach resorts



On April 26th, the County Office of and Zoning's Cultural Planning Resources Division, in cooperation with the Department of Recreation and Parks, dedicated two outdoor interpretive signs at Mayo Beach Park and Beverly Triton Beach Park in Edgewater. The signs are part of a project entitled, "Before the Bay Bridge: Anne Arundel County's 20thC. Beach Resorts," funded in part by grants from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority and Anne Arundel County Trust for Preservation. The signs were unveiled at a formal dedication ceremony attended by a variety of stakeholders, including government officials, heritage professionals, community organizations, researchers, and local residents.

The sign that is located at Mayo Beach Park addresses the origin and history of notable beach resorts in Anne Arundel County. The second sign, installed at Beverly Triton Beach Park, describes the history of Beverly Beach Club and Triton Beach. This collaborative grant project builds on a public program held in August 2016 at Mayo Beach Park that attracted over 500 visitors, and included planned lectures, tables hosted by local historians and researchers, and oral history interviews. The project also included public events held at Beverly Triton Beach, including a STEM archaeology day for 8th grade students from Central Middle School, a heritage hiking trail tour, and a day of plein air painting with artists from the Mid-Atlantic Plein Air Painters Association.

Four Rivers applauds the efforts of our Anne Arundel County partners to preserve what remains of this significant period in local history and the roles these places played in shaping communities and regional identity throughout time. Four Rivers Announces Three Spring Mini-Grants

Three new Four Rivers FY17 Mini-grants were awarded this spring, which totaled \$5,867 in additional grant funds, for projects totaling more than \$108,844. This brings the FY17 total funds awarded to Mini-Grant projects to \$25,019, for projects totaling more than \$293,820. This matching mini-grants program, made possible for the thirteenth year through financial support from the City of Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, and the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, leverages other funding to assist local heritage related non-profit organizations to create new programs, activities, and events that build upon heritage-based interpretive themes, foster collaborative partnerships, and enhance local cultural historic resources and heritage tourism.

Organizations and projects approved for Spring FY2017 Mini-grant awards are:

- Annapolis Arts Alliance, for "Sketch Crawl 2017," an expanded public art event
- The Key School, with Annapolis Book Festival Project, to support new connections with local heritage partners in an expanded festival
- Historic London Town and Gardens, for development of new nature programming with environmental education components.

Four Rivers Inaugurates New Program

"Pop-Up Heritage" events are FREE and open to the public



Four Rivers has developed a new collaborative program that aims to appeal to partners, local residents, and the visiting public alike. "Pop-Up Heritage" events will be offered monthly on an irregular basis at different locations. All events are free and open to the public.

The series began on June 6, with a talk by Archives specialist, Maria Day entitled, "Preserving Digital Prints: Protecting Your Photos and Ink jet Documents from the 1980s to Now," at the Visit Annapolis Visitors Center on West Street. The next event will take place on June 22, when lecturer and guide, David Hanner, will give a presentation, "Charles Zimmerman's Legacy," at the Armel-Leftwich Visitor Center, 52 King George Street in Annapolis, at 3 p.m. This experience will take listeners back to America's Gilded Age, with a look at the life of Charles Zimmerman, USNA Band Master from 1887-1916, best known for composing "Anchors Aweigh."

MARYLAND DAY CELEBRATION 2017

Four Rivers partners had a beautiful weekend to celebrate the 383rd anniversary of our state. This year's theme was "Made in Maryland," with 31 participating sites offering activities that highlighted Maryland food, crafts, history and heritage, with an additional 19 businesses offering specials to Maryland Day visitors.

This year, the Chesapeake Children's Museum took over the organizational tasks, and collaborating partner Erik Evans, of the Inner West Street Association, worked to market and promote the programs through a wide variety of social media platforms. As a result, the event website and page views tripled and a new Facebook event page reached more than 100,000 people. Visit Annapolis and Anne Arundel County's Marketing team also provided significant marketing support, providing exposure on several TV networks that resulted in a notable rise in day-trip visitors.
