Four Rivers Fifteenth Anniversary Celebration Honors Heritage Awards Recipients

The Four Rivers Heritage Area held its Fifteenth Anniversary Celebration and Thirteenth Annual Heritage Awards on Thursday, November 10, 2016, in the Blue Heron Room at Quiet Waters Park in Annapolis.

During the ceremony, Executive Director Carol Benson stated, "We are thrilled to be a part of the outstanding Maryland Heritage Areas Program. It has been a privilege to work with our heritage partners, offering the technical assistance and grant dollars they have to undertake over needed heritage-related projects since our certification in 2001. The results of our activities are clearly visible in the strength and sustainability of brickand-mortar attractions; in the number and quality of heritage experiences for visitors; in the capacity level of partner organizations; and in the collaborative activities and mutually supportive connections among our many stakeholders."

The annual heritage awards recognize individuals, organizations and partnerships that contribute significantly to the community by interpreting, promoting, preserving, and/or supporting our historical legacy. This year's program included the Heritage Partnership Award, which recognizes an outstanding regional partnership in heritage

interpretation or education. This year's award was given to Historic Annapolis and Annapolis Tours by Watermark, for their partnership in creating the popular new "ArchiTrex" walking tour (pictured above).

This year, the Board of Directors announced a new award, the Patricia Barland Leadership Award, named for the former Chair of the Board. This award represents a special recognition-for a leader who shares the dedication to history and heritage that Pat herself has shown.

Additional awards this year included: Heritage Tourism Product Award

This award recognizes an outstanding heritage tourism product created in the past year. The 2016 award recognizes the "Historian Annapolis" Campaign launched by Visit Annapolis and Anne Arundel County, for crafting a powerful and expressive message about the rich heritage of the region, that inspires thousands of visitors to explore our destination.

SPOTLIGHT ON:

Charles Carroll House North Porch Project

A long-awaited restoration project has been completed at the historic home of Charles Carroll, located behind St. Mary's Church in Annapolis. The North facade of the Carroll House was restored to its appearance at the time of the Declaration of Independence.

The design of the restored porch was based on a drawing by E. Sachse & Co. from 1858, the only available image of the original structure.

The restoration efforts began in 2005 when a later structure was removed, exposing the area of the original front door. In 2011, a state bond bill allowed

the project to move forward with the construction of a stately portico, complete with limestone columns, pilasters and a gable roof. The re-opening of the original front door now provides visitors access and restores the grandeur of the North facade when viewed from St. Mary's garden. A new brick walk from the public sidewalk leads visitors to the restored entrance.

Four Rivers Awards Ten New Heritage Mini-Grants

Earlier this month, Four Rivers announced ten new mini-grant awards to local heritage-related non-profit organizations as part of our fall mini-grant program. The grant awards totaled \$19,152, for projects totaling more than \$184,000. This matching mini-grants program, made possible for the thirteenth year through financial support from the City of Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, and the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, leverages other funding to assist local heritage non-profit organizations to create new programs, activities, and events that build upon shared interpretive themes, foster collaborative partnerships, and enhance local cultural historic resources and heritage tourism.

This award recognizes outstanding leadership in stewardship. In 2016 the award is given to the "Weather it Together" Initiative of the Annapolis City Council, for planning for long-term protection of the Annapolis Historic District from the effects of sea-level rise.

Public/Private Initiative Award
