# 2021 Was A Transformative Year!

espite the many challenges of 2021, Four Rivers Heritage Area looks back on a great and transformative year; and as 2022 begins, we look forward to new opportunities to come with our new name and brand.

The year began with an important impact study released by the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority (MHAA), the governing body of the Maryland Heritage Areas Program, that estimated the annual contribution of the Four Rivers Heritage Area to the statewide economy (as of 2019) to be more than \$244.8 million, and 3,469 jobs. The Heritage Areas Program statewide was estimated to have had a total economic contribution of \$2.4 billion, generating an estimated 33,815 jobs in the state. In 2019, nearly 20.7 million tourists in the state were categorized as heritage tourists.

In February, we finalized the map to be used for the Boundary Amendment, marking the first time that our organization had enlarged its geographic definition; and after a public hearing and approval by the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority in April, our "footprint" in Anne Arundel County approximately doubled in size.

The next task undertaken was to meet our new partners across the county who had become part of the heritage area, a process that had been delayed by the pandemic. We called it a "Getting to Know You" year, and the meetings and conversations are still ongoing. Seven new members have been added to the Four Rivers Coordinating Council, an advisory body that meets quarterly.

In July, we commenced our Rebranding process. We selected the Cyphers Agency as our consultant, and announced a plan to develop a new name and brand. We held a fun, creative brainstorming session in late September, and from that input we collaborated on a Creative Brief to inform the rest of the Rebranding process.

In November, while the Rebranding continued, our organization celebrated an important milestone: we cele



brated the Twentieth Anniversary of our certification as one of Maryland's Heritage Areas. As part of that celebration, we recognized the funding impact that has been a large part of the economic contribution cited above: the total state funds invested in grant projects in our heritage area reached \$6.6 Million, and the total project funding for our heritage area's grant projects reached \$22.3 Million.

From a "short list" of name suggestions provided by Cyphers, our Board Subcommittee came up with what we feel is the ideal new name for our larger, more inclusive, and more broadly-themed heritage area: "Chesapeake Crossroads Heritage Area." As we finalize all the elements that go into a brand, and transition to our new identity, look for an announcement that our transformation is complete this Spring!

## Grants Awarded in 2021

In 2021, the Four Rivers Heritage Area brought \$442,039 in state funding to capital and non-capital projects at heritage sites, museums, and municipalities in our area, as well as

three grants to Four Rivers, which include support for our popular mini-grant program. These fully-matched grants leveraged more than \$1.5 million in total project costs.
